Applicants must submit proposals detailing their intended use and technical capability. ICANN reviews applications, considering stability, security, and potential conflicts. Some TLDs, like sponsored TLDs, require oversight by recognized organizations. While this process expands domain options, it raises concerns over brand protection and governance in the growing domain space.
